

DANIEL DRISCOLL BUILDS AND SETTLES NEAR W & E CANAL

Many of the men who dug and built the structures on the Wabash & Erie Canal came from Ireland seeking employment and a better way of life. Daniel Driscoll was one of them.

Daniel Driscoll (1788-1873) and his wife, Mary, came to the United States in 1834 from County Cork, Ireland along with his brothers, John and James, and his sister, Ellen, who married James Elward. Daniel's oldest daughter, Mary, was born in County Cork and married O'Bryan. His second daughter, Ellen, was born in Maryland and married Daniel Buckely.

Traveling with his family across land by covered wagon, Daniel established his home, a lean-to log cabin, on the farm in 1834 and applied for a land grant. This was at the time that work was being let to contractors on the can at Lagro (May 1834). The U. S. Government was granting land in favor of the canal and granted Daniel a farm consisting of 80 acres in Lagro Township, Wabash County, Indiana. This grant was signed by President Andrew Jackson on October 8, 1835. (See Canal Lands p. 13 of Newsletter)

Daniel lived on the farm and worked on the canal, which was completed in this area and water let into it to Wabash, Indiana in 1837. When his canal work was finished he stayed on the land located three miles east of Urbana and one-quarter mile south of the Frushour School and became a farmer. He built a wooden frame house that contained timber from the original log cabin.

After the death of his first wife, Mary, he married Ellen O'Brien, who was also from Ireland. The marriage took place in Lagro, Indiana. They had eight children:

Maret married Dave Kilty; Catherine married Tim Lagro, Timothy married Molly Dolan; Francis and Johanna, who both died at the age of 19; Elizabeth of whom no other record can be found; Sarah married Frank

John Driscoll (1854-1932) came into possession of the farm. He built the current house in front of the wooden frame house. He and his wife, Margaret Spohr, had six children: Ellen married Pete Noonan, Mary remained single, Hugh married Nora Ryan, Will married Teresa Coughlin, Clay married Mary Coughlin, Kathryn married William Sandoz.

Clay Driscoll (1887-1961) became owner of the farm in 1934. He and his wife, Mary Coughlin, had seven children: Eileen married Lawrence Scheiber; Cletus; Mark married Lorene Miller; Leona married Gerald Campbell and lives in Marion, IN; Robert married Gene Eiler and lives in Urbana, IN; Lloyd married Norma Foltz and lives in Huntington, IN and Rita married Richard James Alexander.


Eugene T. Driscoll (1918-), son of Hugh Driscoll and great grandson of Daniel Driscoll, purchased the farm in September 1986 from his uncle Clay. Eugene and his wife, Anne Tworek, had four children: Mollie Ann married Frank Marsh and lives in Mountain Home, ID; Eugenia married Robert Cicero and lives in Florence, KY; Matthew married Angela Wilson and lives in Urbana, IN on the farm; and Frank married Beth Treska and lives in Urbana, IN.

The present house, built in 1884 on the farm, has since been remodeled and now contains 7 rooms. Living there today with their parents Matthew and Angela are the gr.-gr.-great grandchildren of Daniel Driscoll: Bridget, Kaitlin, Shannah and Ryan Driscoll.


Daniel Driscoll's farm has been home to six generations of Driscolls. It is unique in that it still has a family living on it with the Driscoll last name.



Above: Daniel Driscoll, one of the construction workers on the Wabash & Erie Canal, purchased 80 acres of land in 1834 in the Lagro, Indiana area. The canal was completed through Lagro to Wabash, Indiana in 1836-37 Daniel remained in Lagro, built a lean-to log cabin, and began clearing the land for farming. He then built this farm house and barn, which have remained in the Driscoll family for over 150 years. It has been designated a Hoosier Homestead Farm. Six generations of Driscolls have lived on the farm (superscript numbers indicate generations):

Clay3 & Mary Driscoll
