Jacob married Caroline Frey on August 14, 1836. This marriage produced seven children. On February 3, 1859 their youngest child, Jacob J. Wilhelm, was born. Jacob J. grew up on the farm and was educated in Dearborn county.

On his farm Jacob, our subject, raised sheep. He carded, spun and had the wool woven into cloth, which he then sold in Cincinnati.

While farming, Jacob also bought and sold farms in Dearborn county. He moved to a farm in Kelso township Dearborn county. There Caroline Frey Wilhelm, Jacob's wife, died in 1860. He then was married to Catharine Wissel Young on February 4, 1862. She was 8 years older being 57 years of age at that time. They had no children. Catherine passed away in 1863.
